Membership performance awards program inaugurated, initial presentations in '65

LONG BEACH—A National JACL awards program recognizing leadership performance in membership performance is being inaugurated for the 1964 calendar year. Initial presentations were scheduled in early 1965, according to Dr. David M. Long, national membership chairman.

Perpetual trophies are being offered in five categories: (1) highest growth in membership; (2) highest percentage of growth; (3) highest number of new members; (4) highest percentage of new members; (5) largest single chapter. The perpetual trophy will be retired to the chapter winning it the most times during a 36-month period.

Within the first hour of the above-mentioned categories, competition is being divided into four divisions:

- A—200 and over; (2) B—150 to 200; (3) C—100 to 150; (4) D—50 to 100.

Two other categories: (6) any chapter with 100 or more members; (7) any chapter with 100 or more members.

Chapters will be presented permanent trophies for winning in each of the divisions, but the overall leader in the categories will be inscribed on the perpetual trophy.

WHEREAS the Pacific Southwest District Council of the Japanese American Citizens League has vigorously supported the principle of equality of opportunity for all persons in all areas of life, including housing, are fundamental rights of all Americans regardless of race, color, creed or national origin; and

WHEREAS the National Fair Housing Act, passed after the housing laws of state, would implement this principle by cancelling and subjecting without imposing criminal penalties or interfering with property rights, the orderly flow of real estate affairs; and

WHEREAS the initiative amendment proposed by the California Real Estate Association would commit the State of California through constitutional action to a policy of discriminatory practices in housing; and
