## 7,000 or 100 Californians vote; dump fair housing law 2-1

SAN JOSE - Now that Prop. 13 has been approved, a contingent resolution adopted by the Northern California Western Nevada JACL District Council here Nov. 1 was effected.

It follows the two other JACL district councils in the state to join a cooperative effort with other organizations to lead the constitutional of the provisions of Prop. 13.

The resolution also recognizes the fight against Prop. 13 is part of the larger struggle against bigotry and pledges itself to continue in this effort.

The Pacific Southwest District Council will meet this Sunday in Santa Barbara to consider the issue. The Central California District Council is expected to discuss the resolution at its district convention in Fresno Dec. 6.

To Continue Fight  
SANTA BARBARA - Noting that political parties have been elected in the state, the JACL District Council is expected to support any move to fight the measure if it passes.

Gov. Brown last week indicated he may ask for a special election to reconsider the measure if the measure was adopted. He also said there would be a court case to test the constitutionality of the measure.

## President's Corner

## Program &amp; Activities Prospect

In my inaugural article of Aug. 7, I announced that the chairman of the six major committees were to be asked to use this column to elucidate on their assignments. By this means, it should be possible for me to enunciate their proposals of what the JACL can do, as it relates to their specific committee purposes.

I would like to introduce here the second of this series by looking upon our National Third Vice President Roger Hachiyu, who is Chairman of the National Program & Activities Committee.

He will, in the following article, outline his thoughts in regard to what can be done in the specific area of program and activities.

National President Kumeo Yoshinori

has asked me to let you know a few random thoughts as well as ideas from a national National Program and Activities Committee which have just formed in Salt Lake City.

In projecting ideas for Program and Activities of the JACL, one cannot help but dwell on two lines of thought as guidelines to help us do as members. They are:

1. We are the only organization to represent the Japanese American community in this country.

2. We are the only organization to represent the Japanese American community in this country.

Our quarter century history of the JACL reflects that programs and activities of the chapters have consistently adhered to these policies. Our National President Kumeo wishes this committee to come up with a dynamic program in keeping with the 38th Annual National Convention Theme "Human Dignity—Our Challenge." The National President's word "dynamic" resonates a little, but the cooperation of JACLers everywhere is willing to give it a try.

In our informal discussions, we have touched upon subjects as the Old Age Assistance Program, their development of Youth organization, liaison committee to help their communication between local law enforcement agencies and the minority groups, participation in the Nisei in city planning, management of some type of chapter publications, National Credit Union participation, and our relationship as citizens.

Assistance for the Aging

We have learned from our experience in conducting local programs that the Nisei in the Project that the plight of the elderly is becoming more serious year by year. Here is where we can help.

There is a Federal Bill that makes available to qualified agencies that will aid in the financing of homes for the aged. When this information is clarified to this committee, we will make available definite procedure on "how to become eligible" to apply for these grants.

Most of the Youth work is in capable hands of the National Youth Commission under First Vice President Jerry Kamekura, but we hope to come up with some worthwhile suggestions. Our former IDC Youth Commission member, Sue Kamekura, has added further laurels to her accomplishments by organizing the Salt Lake Jr. JACL staff much effort. Her personal experiences will be of immeasurable value to both the local and national endeavors.

With the Federal Civil Rights Law now in effect, there has arisen many problems of enforcement confronting the local offices. There is a need for a channel through which the minority groups and the officers can contact each other to facilitate the solution of these problems. Here, the Salt Lake City, the Public Safety Commission

has organized a Liaison Committee for Public Relations. They meet monthly or as often as required to study the kinds of civil rights violations to make evaluations and recommendations. Many of the committee members are ministers representing various faiths in addition to minority representation. The JACL is represented by Alvin Kasai.

Many of the larger cities, especially in the West, have been faced with major renovations and improvements in life with the new Century program. In Salt Lake City, the so-called "14th Tokyo" area will be razed to make way for a four-block area of commercial use. The City officials have been concerned that a Japanese shopping center be established for the benefit of those being ousted as well as preservation of oriental culture.

JACL should be well represented in high-visibility in every chapter city from the ground floor to the top of the skyscraper.

As the future of the City of Salt Lake City is being planned, we must have a distinguished group of committee members to develop the new Japanese Community Center.

Harry Honda, our PC editor, is most anxious to promote the chapter belief in the financing of the Pacific Citizens to get the city Chapter building should receive one of the top priority for program consideration for every chapter.

Just a word of reminder about the National Credit Union. Please bear in mind that it is "National". Although it is located in Salt Lake City as this is where it was first organized, it is for members everywhere. We urge you to take advantage of its low interest rates on loans and high interest rates on savings.

Citizenship Day

As an organization that made possible the naturalization of our parents, we should take advantage of such promotional events as the Citizenship Day. Sept. 17th, 1964, Constitution Week. Congress established this day in 1962 for public recognition of all who by coming of age or by naturalization have become voting citizens, at this time the day our Constitution was adopted in 1787-1791 years ago. Let us forget our parents were accepted as citizens the last year that Congress established this public recognition for those naturalized 12 years ago.

We are to promote the Registration and Voting Information to our members and particularly to the new citizens, be they 21 or 31, and see that they are registered, be it in the deep north or in Hawaii.

# From the Frying Pan

AND SO WE MOVE ONWARD — I cannot recall any political campaign in which more people said they wished the whole thing were done and over with long before election day dragged. In perhaps our campaign periods are too long now for a people who have become accustomed to the speed of jet flight, direct distance dialing and instant postage. Back in the days of whistle-stop campaign trains, a candidate needed time to wind his way across the country to be heard and seen. Today he can get a hearing in virtually every home in the country simultaneously by way of television. Unfortunately the quality of the oratory has not kept pace with the speed of communications.

In some countries, notably Britain and Japan, the period of political campaigning is limited by law. In others, the amount of money that may be spent in a campaign is restricted. By custom we build up to a furious crescendo every four years, then all but go into hibernation until the next cycle begins. How much better it would be if we could maintain a high level of political interest from year to year. Then there would be no need for the frenzied activity of the election years, and the chances of getting better government would be infinitely better.

If one were to take seriously the shogun charges leveled in the heat of political battle—some foreign observers have done this—he would be convinced this nation would collapse in chaos the day the other party seized power. But somehow this has never happened, and we muddle along until the next oratorical orgy. Democracy is a great thing, but perhaps it needs some streamlining.

**STATUS SYMBOLS** — A recent news item out of Tokyo reports that the "three treasures" desired most by Japanese households until a short while ago were an electric washing machine, an electric refrigerator, and a television set. These goals have been achieved now by a large percentage of urban families, and now the "treasures" have been upgraded to an automobile, a villa and an air conditioner.

The question that logically follows us: "What are the current status symbols among the Nisei? I suppose that depends on where he lives and what he likes to do. Cadillac and minks, I've been told, are fairly common, although not by my league. Some families consider a deep-freezer and a stereo set as necessities with color television close behind. What's left to covet? A cabin cruiser? Private airplane, fishing cabin, swimming pool? You tell me. Perhaps we are particularly status-conscious in this high country outfit, but we seem to be less concerned with the status value of material possessions than people in places, let's say, like Southern California. Or to put it another way, we have less need to spend.

I can remember when anyone who could afford to buy a new Model T Ford was considered affluent. But by the time the Model A made its debut, times were good enough that our well-to-do friends were driving Buicks. My first car was a second hand Star touring with celluloid curtains and while it ran somewhat faster than a Model T, it was nowhere as reliable.

**THEY LEFT TOO SOON** — As frugal and self-sacrificing as most Issei were, they like most immigrant groups were exceptionally status conscious. It was a matter of great gratification when their Nisei offspring were able to move to white collar jobs, even though that meant less pay (and more expenses) than if they'd stayed on the farm or continued to drive truck.

Unfortunately, most Issei left this life too soon to enjoy the pleasure of seeing Nisei succeeding in everything from politics to the arts, medicine to the law, high finance to science and engineering. The times have changed, indeed.

**HONOLULU** — Sen. Daniel K. Inoué last week voiced his support for the Supreme Court's 1962 decision outlawing required Bible readings in public schools because this infringes upon the First Amendment's freedom of religion clause.

Inoué also voiced opposition to the proposed Becker amendment which would override the Supreme Court decision, when he introduced a Constitutional amendment.

Speaking at Harte Memorial Church, Inoué said of the amendment proposed by New York Congressmen Frank J. Becker, "there has never been a similar attempt in the 175 years of the existence of the Constitution."

The senator said that the Becker amendment is a "frontal assault upon the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States" and may seriously threaten the integrity of the entire Bill of Rights.

**Harte Bill of Rights**  
Some of the arguments offered against the amendment note that it is adopted, "a precedent will have been set from which will be launched further inroads upon the Bill of Rights."

The Supreme Court's decision on civil rights and liberties prove disapprovable in some. Inoué said, "It may be the First Amendment's freedom of religion today."
