Immigration amendments due early committee study

Washington

Chances are better than ever that this year next, there will be some liberalization in immigration opportunities afforded by the Congress. Indeed, the interim actual origin system of racial discrimination against most people of south established in 1954 may be discarded or drastically altered.

The House Immigration and Naturalization Committee was introduced in the Senate as S. 306 by Philip A. Masaoka

Eastland has been an opponent of liberalized immigration legislation, as he has been from Democratic from the South and the Border States and most Republicans from the Midwest. At the same time, it is interesting to note that only Senator Eastland remains of members of both the Subcommittee on the Full Census and the members of the Judiciary Committee in 1952.

In the last Session, Chairman Michael A. Feighan (D-Ohio) indicated that there would be an exhaustive investigation of the operations of the existing law and regulations by the Joint Committee on Immigration and Nationality Policy, as established by the 1952 Fuller-Bucarosa Act but which has never been organized and supplied with operational funds, before any major revisions of the law should be considered.

The Democratic Subcommittee members this year are, in addition to Chairman Feighan, Frank Chel (Ky.); Peter Rodino (N.J.); Harold D. Donohoe (Mass.); Jack Keenan (Conn.); Joseph P. Gilbert (N.Y.); (The Republican members are Arch A. Moore (W. Va.); William T. Cahill (N.J.); and Clark MacGregor (Maine); Richard A. Poff (W. Va.), a member last Session, was assigned to another subcommittee.

When JACL sent before the House Immigration Subcommittee last fall, while endorsing the Administration Bill in principle, JACL urged that some of the administrative discretion authorized in the legislation be curbed and that safeguards be written into the legislation in order that another period of Oriental exclusion, inadvertent though it may be this time, may not, in fact, occur again.

While all Republican members of the Subcommittee were not members of the Judiciary Committee in 1952, when the last major overhaul of the immigration law was approved by the Feighan, Chel, and Rodino were members of the Full Committee and Feighan and Chel of the Immigration Subcommittee 12 years ago.

exclusion will come into being. Nevertheless, as the hearings this year, JACL will again urge that safeguards be written into the legislation that will assure every nation of the Far East, among others, minimum immigration until the transition period is completed and all the peoples of earth are on the same basis for immigration purposes.

The Administration "formula" for eliminating the national origins system provides for the production of annual immigration quotas by 20 percent a year, so that by the end of five years all of these national quotas are gone and are replaced by a general immigration pool. Visas from this general immigration pool would be authorized on a "first come, first served" basis, with administrative discretion to take care of any injustices or emergencies.

JACL recalls that most European countries have been readmitting for immigration visas since 1904, when the national origins system was introduced. While the Japanese, for example, could not register until the end of 1952.

JACL is asking that every country be assured the minimum number of visas, on the established preference priority, to assure that no country will be "short" through the operation of a law intended to eliminate racial quotas of our current immigration law.

JACL believes that it is duty bound to carry on the educational campaign that will, in fact, provide safeguards even though it may not be written into the law itself.

Rep. Matsunaga addresses San Francisco JACL Installation; feels education has key role in solving problems of America

SAN FRANCISCO—The civil rights law passed by Congress last year is working even in the 23rd South where many evidences of changing conditions are being reported. Harold Rep. Spook M. Matsunaga told an audience of 250 at the Fairmont Hotel Jan. 26.

The 50th state Democratic congressman was the main speaker at the San Francisco JACL's annual installation dinner after spending the day at Mare Island for the launching of the Polaris nuclear submarine Kamehameha.

"I am proud to have been a member of the 86th Congress that accomplished so much in the area of education and civil rights," he declared.

Matsunaga recalled that during the House debate on the bill he pointed out that no child should be denied an education. He said that he is hopeful that this law will be obeyed, not for fear of any penalty, but because people feel that the law is fair.

Stresses Education
The congressman chose three of the current administration's programs for his talk—civil rights, poverty and unemployment.

"And we must pass on this heritage to our children," he added.
