## Nisei Dilemma - II


This column is not unfamiliar with the determination and sacrifice of the Issei generation, nor the sacrifice and accomplishments of the older Nisei. In fact, much space has been used here to encourage knowledge of our heritage and pride in being Americans of Japanese ancestry. Yet, although there are many positive points to boast about, there are also some lamentable aspects to the present Nisei character that should be brought out to be aired and discussed. And these "hangups" seem all mixed up with contradictions of good intentions with narrow interpretations and direction. and direction

contradictions of good intentions with marrow interpretations and direction. For example, we are almost religiously committed to maximum education for ourselves and our children and at the same time appear overly fearful of free thought which is assumed to be the desired consequence and purpose for seeking knowledge. Another example is our purported effort towards the goal to become better citizens and work toward making a better America. Yet our actions reflect an attitude of doing nothing or even worse of joining the majority in maintaining the status quo. To become better citizens re-quires alertness and action; to have a better America re-quires change. Or are we actually satisfied with an America that in the spring of 1942 ordered the incarceration of its people based not on crime but on race? What really causes me worry is that we are slowly but surely becoming masters of the "non sequitur"; that is, the Nisel is falling more and more into the habit of answering all "threatening" questions regarding his present course and future with unrelated, rehearsed answers. Whenever the Nisel feels attacked, he ruishes back to the protection and security of the old fort-the Issei-Nisei hardships, sacrifices and security of the old fort-the lasei-Nisei hardships, sacrifices
